## Nourish food pantry opens at Watsonville Community Hospital

Trailblazing idea to address health outcomes becomes reality

**WATSONVILLE, CA, February 8, 2024** – When a person doesn't have access to enough safe, healthy food, it can lead to all kinds of health issues including diabetes, obesity, hypertension, and more. Good nutrition starting at an early age, on the other hand, can mean better long-term health. That's why Watsonville Community Hospital and Second Harvest Food Bank Santa Cruz County have partnered to open Nourish, one of the first food pantries located inside a hospital in California.

Having a food pantry within the walls of a hospital is a trailblazing idea that demonstrates the type of innovation happening at Watsonville Community Hospital. There are only a small handful of similar initiatives between food banks and health clinics in California seeking to address nutrition as an underlying factor of good health.

According to Erica Padilla-Chavez, executive director of Second Harvest Food Bank Santa Cruz County, "across the country, food banks recognize nutrition as a social determinant of health, but we're proud to lead the way with this cutting-edge program right here in Watsonville that brings healthy food directly to people receiving healthcare."

The idea for Nourish began in the summer of 2023 when Padilla-Chavez, her sister June Ponce, executive director of Watsonville Community Hospital Foundation, and then-interim CEO of Watsonville Community Hospital Matko Vranjes had a conversation about the importance of giving back to the community they've called home their whole lives.

"Matko, my sister Erica, and I all grew up in Watsonville," explains Ponce. "We remember standing in line at the Food Bank as kids. Nourish was borne out of a desire to give back. Now that Watsonville Community Hospital is non-profit and owned by the community again, we are able to partner with other community-based organizations, and when we do that, it's easy to collaborate because we have a shared vision of making things happen for our neighbors in need."

Nourish specifically targets pre- and post-natal women and their families. Expectant mothers can pick up a variety of fresh, local produce and healthy shelf-stable foods like rice, beans, and an assortment of canned goods, throughout their pregnancy and after the delivery.

According to a <u>study</u> published in the *American Journal of Obstetrics & Gynecology*, "comprehensive improvements in nutrition and health status of women before and during pregnancy will contribute to optimal fetal growth, favorable obstetrical outcomes, improved perinatal survival, and the potential for better long-term health in both the mother and offspring."

Stephen Gray, CEO of Watsonville Community Hospital and the Pajaro Valley Healthcare District says Nourish is part of the overall vision of the organization. "We fully anticipate this will be just the first of many ways we can address health equity in the Pajaro Valley and make an impact on the health outcomes both within and outside the walls of our hospital."

In addition to providing free food, Nourish staff can help people with other services, including signing up for Cal Fresh, getting recertified for Medi-Cal and getting information about CalWorks. And if visiting Nourish is difficult with their busy schedule, expectant moms can sign up to have food delivered to their home, thanks to a partnership between Second Harvest Food Bank Santa Cruz County and Amazon.

Although Nourish is initially being promoted to expectant mothers, any patient or visitor to Watsonville Community Hospital can get fresh food at the pantry; nobody will be turned away.

Nourish is currently funded for one year. The goal now is to secure ongoing philanthropic funding, so it can continue to support moms and babies now and into the future.

Nourish is located just to the right of the main lobby of Watsonville Community Hospital, 75 Nielson St, Watsonville. Starting Monday, February 19, hours of operation will be Monday – Thursday, 1 - 6pm, and Friday 9am - 12pm.
